A learning program for DCP's Child Protective Specialists, supervisors and managers working in CARES Units.

ABOUT This learning program is designed to facilitate a collaborative conversation among Department of Child Protection (DCP) professionals about the practical aspects of the ACS Collaborative, Assessment, Response & Support (CARES) approach. Learners examine each major decision point in the life of a CARES case, from screening to case closure. Learners are also invited to reflect on their CARES practice, to be open to sharing and learning with their peers across the city, to engage in polling questions connected to various scenarios, and to participate in breakout room group discussions. Before attending this virtual, instructor-led training, learners must complete all course prerequisites listed below.

BENEFITS Learners will:

- Understand that CARES is one of ACS's strategies to address racial equity disparities in the NYC Child Welfare system.
- Acknowledge implicit biases and how they impact decisions and outcomes for families.
- Maintain safety-focused practice at all decision-making points of a referral in a manner consistent with the CARES approach.
- Reinforce the Solution-Focused Practice approach throughout the life of a CARES case.

COMPONENTS

Once enrolled in the course, learners will complete:



A four-hour, virtual, instructor-led workshop training.
